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3. What interesting facts do we learn about Andrew and his brother Simon from Mark 1:29, Luke 5:10?

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4. Andrew's evangelistic style is different from Simon Peter, James and John. How so?

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5. What are the implications of Andrew's actions found in Mt. 14, Mk. 6, Lk.9 and Jn. 6?

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6. When was the last time you did something little that God used in ways you did not anticipate?

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7. How do you relate to MacArthur's statement (pg. 83 of my book)? "Most pastors would love to have their churches populated with people with Andrew's mentality. Too many Christians think that because they can't speak in front of groups or because they don't have leadership gifts, they aren't responsible to evangelize."

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8. Why does MacArthur state that Andrew's example is a better model for leadership than Peter's? In your experience which leadership style do you see as the most effective?

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9. MacArthur wrote that most people come to Christ through the personal relationship with other believers. Do you agree? How did you come to Christ?

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10. What lesson do you see from MacArthur's story about Edward Kimble and D. L. Moody?

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
